Every Sunday We Boldly Enter the Presence of God

Every Sunday we gather together and, during part of our time of worship, bow our heads and pray, expecting to have the attention and presence of God with us. In fact, we believe that about the entire worship service, from the prelude through the benediction; that the Holy Spirit, the presence of God, has joined and is in the Sanctuary with us. Sunday morning, therefore, is a time in which we corporately meet with God.

Originally, This Was a Dangerous Thing to Do

To understand this happy condition, we consider a sacred day on the Hebrew Calendar, the day of Yom Kippur, or the Day of Atonement which takes place on October 9 this year. You can read about it in Leviticus (16; 23:26-32) and in Numbers (29:7-11). If you go back to the beginning of Leviticus 16, you will notice an important detail. The Lord God gave instructions how to enter the presence of God, once a year in the Holy of Holies within the Tabernacle, and survive. Aaron's two sons, priests like their father, had attempted to enter the presence of God improperly and were struck dead. This is a side to the holiness of God that we tend to forget in these days in which we can presume to approach the Almighty simply by offering a prayer and any time or any place, and particularly when we gather together on Sunday morning.

We Can Do This Because of Jesus our High Priest

All of this serves to help us understand the wonder of the promise of the grace of God, not that God is no longer holy, or that we can enter His presence without any concern about wrath or sin, but because this grace has been secured for us. Instead of a high priest, careful to follow instructions, entering the presence for us once a year, Jesus, our great high priest, has entered for us, giving us the opportunity to all meet with God at any time. Hebrews 6:19-20 says this: "This hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast, and which entered the Presence behind the veil, where the forerunner has entered, for us, even Jesus, having become High Priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek. The idea behind Yom Kippur is not irrelevant, it is still in force, but has been fulfilled for all time by Jesus Himself. Because of that we can boldly approach a holy and mighty God, but, knowing this, we can approach with awe and gratitude.

SENIORS CITIZENS: YOU CAN MAKE YOUR GIFTS TO FCC TAX DEDUCTABLE IN ADDITION TO THE STANDARD DEDUCTION FOR 2019

Those of you who have reached age 70 ½ can take the new standard deduction which is double what it was for 2017 and contribute directly to a charity tax free. This contribution to the charity will become part of your required minimum distribution (RMD) from your IRA. The financial institution that holds your IRA must do a direct transfer to First Congregational Church for this transaction to meet tax code requirements. Also please follow these steps in order to ensure the contribution is coded correctly: Make sure the financial institution includes your name somewhere on the check stub. You should also be able to designate the frequency of donation for that fiscal year. Notify the church treasurer of your intentions and if possible, add a designation along with your name such as "tithes", "Endowment", a "project name" or "program name".

Please note this is to be used for informational purposes only. This is not tax advice and it should not be viewed as such. Please consult with your tax advisor for any questions on using RMD as a tax strategy.





It is an informal evening gathering where the missionaries and those attending the meeting have a chance to meet face to face. It is also a time for the missionaries to thank and spend time with their donors.

All of the recent receptions had one thing in common – chocolate! M&M's were used to mark on a table map where NACCC missions are located around the world and how many folks had visited that mission. Some M&M's never made it to the map of course. Greg Jurewicz, chair of the Alumni Association, has made wraps for over 70 chocolate bars each year with the MOMC theme for the reception. Those candy bars are handed out at the reception and made available on the MOMC display table for those who pass by.
