Time for quiet reflection and planning

One of the most ambitious projects that we do on a regular basis is Vacation Bible School, which would not be possible without the hard work of many people. Children learn from Scripture that a church is a place where people love each other, and that Christ is well worth following. After that, everybody needs a time to slow down a little bit. August approaches the end of the season, but the events of Youth Group, Rally Sunday have yet to take place. This is the time where we can pause and reflect and make plans for the Fall and coming Winter.

Law of liberty

With that in mind, I spent some time pondering the advice of James, the brother of the Lord Jesus, about the value of carefully reflecting on Scripture. He called it the "perfect law of liberty" revealing his view that the injunctions of Scripture liberate instead of constricting or imprisoning. Imagine a road with guard rails. The rails aren't there just to limit you, they keep you on the road to your destination and help you avoid all sorts of trouble. Scripture does the same thing in that it keeps us on the path of God when we could wander into all sorts of situations that would troublesome, painful or even dangerous if left to our own devices. It is another example that freedom is not being able to do what you want, but rather being able to serve God without hindrance.

Importance of application

But James warns us to "be not hearers of the word only but doers". In fact, this is the main point of his letter to the early church. I've always understood this to mean that we reflect on Scripture until we get to a point of application; either we learn something new about God or about life, or we have a point of action to our life. We need to draw some conclusion, some application to ourselves in order to be a doer of the Word. It takes some time, but it's worth it, and now is a good time to relax, plan and reflect.

The Center for Parish Development (among the professionals in the renewal process) has a beautiful description of church – "The Household of God." They write:

The word "household" is associated with many images: parenthood, childhood, birth, adoption, brother- and sisterhood, familial love, and domestic service. Describing the church as "household of God" indicates a communal understanding of the Christian Experience. Membership in this new household involves sharing in a common life held together by shared commitments and to the way of life in Christ. It is a way of life that does not make sense if lived apart. The Christian identity is distinctly a communal identity. VBS was a wonderful shared experience by many hard workers and happy campers. It was a joy to see members of the congregation and youngsters all pulling together toward a common understanding of the joys and strengths of life as a "family in Christ," even if only for a few hours over the course of 5 days. Kudos to the many workers from the congregation who supported the effort! Way to go church family!

- a. Have supervision over the worship services and assist Pastor in the administration of the sacraments. [Communion Preparation ~ Packers, Decorations ~Lynn Maas]
- b. Arrange for greeters, ushers and lay readers at worship services. [Rotating]
- c. Work with the Pastor to develop a vital fellowship and to promote the spiritual interests of the congregation. [Harvest Dinner]
- d. Have supervision over parish visitation. [Gaynors, Hasslers, Donn]
- e. Review the membership of the Church periodically......
- f. Secure a pulpit replacement for the Pastor.....[Julianne, Pastor Dan]
- g. Name delegates to Association meetings and to other religious gatherings to which the church should have official delegates. [Board]
- h. Provide a representative to serve as a member of the Personnel Committee. [Chair]
- i. Each expense item incurred by this Board shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees for payment.
- j. Have supervision over the Music Committee. [Krystal, Julianne, Pat, Pastor Dan]

from our Leadership

Dear Friends of the NACCC and Supporters of the Congregational Way,

In 1645, John Cotton published The Way of Christ in New England, in which he described the nature of the relationship between congregational churches. One of the points made by him in this treatise was that, while individual churches had no jurisdiction over other churches, the churches could and must walk and work together in coordination.

This is an apt image of the way the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches (NACCC) functions. The NACCC is made up of self-governing and autonomous local congregations choosing to be in communion with one another. Our individual member churches hold the work and ministry of the NACCC, as a whole, in trust, so that every local congregation can be supported to be as vital and healthy as it can be. Despite the challenges of the past year, this remains true. Within the NACCC, there is the sense that each church is supported by all of the other churches, and we work together in communion with one another and with Christ to do the work of God's Kingdom in our world.

We want to share some of the accomplishments of the past year:

- The partnership with the Center for Parish Development continues and is moving to create a new path forward to help our member churches in their journey to revitalization. Currently, five churches are engaged in this process with plans to include more.
- A 2nd Virtual Annual Meeting is being held and expanded from last year with lectures, workshops and social time added to the business meeting and worship.
- The Racial Justice Task Team is creating and organizing resources for use in our member churches on racism. The goal is to provide a safe and open place to discuss what can be a difficult topic.
- A new Lay Ministry Training Program is set to enroll its first cohort in Fall 2021.
- A new website for all things associated with the NACCC was launched in the Spring.
- After three years of work, the Board of Directors, and the Board of Governors of the Congregational Foundation (CF) worked together to transfer designated endowments to the CF.
- Finally, as Michael Chittum announced his retirement, the Search Committee completed their work in a timely fashion and have named Rev. Dr. Ashley Cook Cleere as the new Executive Director for the NACCC and the CF.

It is our privilege to join with you as we work together to support one another. It is good to come together to serve God and to advance the Congregational Way!


