

The Spiritual Discipline of Silence and Solitude From the book, <u>Spiritual Disciplines for the Christian Life</u> by Donald S. Whitney (Navpress, Colorado Springs, 1991)

"The Bet" by Anton Chekov

In the book I've been reading this year on Spiritual Disciplines, the chapter on Silence and Solitude includes a description of a short story by the great Russian writer Anton Chekov in which a wealthy banker, wanting to prove that solitary confinement is worse than death, challenges an upstart young lawyer with a bet. If the young lawyer can withstand being alone for five years, the banker will give him 5 million rubles. He will have everything that he requests, but without human contact. The lawyer offers to do 15 years and so is imprisoned in a find house on the estate of the banker, with everything he could request, save any human contact. Guards were hidden on the estate to see if the lawyer would escape and so lose the bet.

The lawyer did not leave but stayed in his private house for fifteen years. He received good food, any book he wanted and had access to a grand piano. For the first few years people heard the grand piano day and night. Over the next few years, he read dozens of books from the classics, and then taught himself how to read in several languages Then he spent years studying the Scriptures and theology. The last couple of years he added reading in a variety of subject in addition to the Scriptures and theology.

The night before the bet was to end, the banker, now impoverished and desperate not to lose the 5 million rubles, decides to sneak into the house and kill the lawyer, now forty years old. He finds the lawyer asleep in a chair, his head resting on a table with a letter addressed to the banker. In it he tells the banker that all the wisdom of this world amounts to nothing in the face of eternity and he has decided God is far more valuable than money. To show his contempt for earthly wealth, the lawyer wrote that he plans to escape his house five hours before the time limit, thus losing the bet. The banker, ashamed, leaves and the last we read of the lawyer was the report of the guards watching him leave the estate hours before the deadline to win the bet. The years of silence made the lawyer wise, and aware that the things of this earth are as nothing compared to eternity.

Moses and Paul, in the Scriptures, spent years in the desert, often alone and in silence. I'm not suggesting that we all move to the dessert of the Middle East, or we lock ourselves in our houses for fifteen years, but an hour spent in silence before the Lord in prayer may do wonders to our perspective, especially in the busy culture in which we live. # Mission and Benevolence Committee Wants YOU to be Engaged and in the Know 9/26/23 - Kim Schryver, Chairman



Benevolence

We admire the values and the engagement of My Kinsman Ministry: 1) to supply opportunity, not simple charity; 2) recognize, train, and empower the most effective disciples in Sierra Leone – Sierra Leonians; 3) expect those helped by MKM to HELP OTHERS. FCC supports their fruitful work financially (\$5,000 in 2023), through material donations (e.g. bibles, backpacks, and first aid supplies) and spiritual support. Our prayers for the safety and effectiveness of MKM disciples In Sierra Leone is one way this church can stand in with these committed missionaries. We urge all FCC members to include MKM success in their prayers. A second way to spiritually support them is by befriending them through correspondence, making ourselves known to them, inviting them to correspond with us and communicating our care and encouragement. A few members of the church (including some youth) have participated in letter writing campaigns in the past. Join members of the Benevolence and Mission Committee at the **Women's Ministry Meeting on Monday, October 2, 2023** (5:30 pm in Fellowship Hall) to write letters to members of MKM. We'll provide church letterhead, ideas on what to write and deliver your letters to local MKM leadership who will be traveling with our letters of encouragement to Sierra Leone in November, 2023.

The committee researched homelessness in Marshall County and the limited resources available to help people out of this difficult life circumstance. Nearly 2,500 people are experiencing homelessness in Iowa at any given time. As of September 26, 2023, 754 people are without stable lodging in the Two Rivers Region (Boone, Greene, Hardin, Marshall and Story counties). Of these, 153 individuals are in Marshall County. The Bridge Home is the source of our information. It is a national agency, and the Two Rivers Region affiliate provides unique help to those who have fallen on hard times. Their mission includes "to bridge the gap between homelessness and housing by providing shelter, support, and inspiring a pathway forward to individuals and families experiencing or on the verge of homelessness." (See https://www.thebridgehome.org) Our local United Way endorses and supports their work. We know that they work with local agencies to help fill this gap and to empower those who need assistance to find a way out of homelessness. With no free shelters in Marshall County, emergency shelter is purchased one hotel room at a time. While some hotels do give this non-profit a break in price, the cost of emergency shelter in Marshall County consumes the majority of the budget allocated to our area. The committee agreed unanimously to help support this important work through a financial contribution of \$1000.

Hands on opportunities abound in support of our Youth Program. Shelly Speas, Youth Director, has issued a schedule of meeting times for our younger youth (Tuesdays in the next 3 months) and teens (Wednesdays in the next 3 months). They need help transporting participants and providing a meal. Every member of Missions and Benevolence endorses this need; each committee member individually volunteers throughout the year in various ways to our youth. We urge ALL members of the congregation who can to do so as well.

Johnny Guzman from Guzman Family Ministries will be in the Midwest in November 2023. Pastor Dan and the committee are considering ways to facilitate Johnny and his wife Mary visiting FCC to get an important update of their work. Watch for more news to come in the next month.

Two final words for now. First, YOU ARE IMPRESSIVE! The Meals on Wheels Volunteer Calendar for 2023 has been filled! The 2024 calendar is now also in the narthex. Keep on raising your hands, fellow congregants! The program relies on all of us to help meet the needs of shut-ins and elderly for nutritional support. Contact Kristi Hassler, MOW Leader, for more information. Krisiti does wonderful work keeping volunteers tuned into their commitment and recruiting. About 50 % of slots for delivery are filled by volunteers who are NOT members of the Benevolence and Missions Comm. Way to go FCC team!

Second, Jonna Wagar will be cluing us into our Adopt-A-Family plans for Christmas 2023. The House of Compassion is finalizing a roster of recipients who qualify for this service and the recommended guidelines for support. As soon as the committee has this information, we will identify how many people/families FCC will commit to adopting. Watch for more news soon on how YOU can participate in making Christmas a holiday of personal charitable giving and joy.

### **News from Diaconate Board**

The Organ Rededication was wonderful. We were so pleased to see our members and friends from Glenwood Place be able to attend. Our guest organist, Dr. Babcock, is also the chorale director at Central. He asked us if we would be interested in hosting a concert by his choir when they were touring in our area. We couldn't say "yes" fast enough.

**DID YOU KNOW?** 4 members of the Diaconate – Judy Gaynor, Bob Gaynor, Kristi Hassler and Donn Anderson visit our members in facilities every month. Every visit they take them greeting cards made by our Stamp Club. In addition the Stamp Club makes treat boxes for them on Halloween, Christmas and Valentine's Day. The Stamp Club sends out about 400 cards a year and is funded by the Diaconate budget. Most of the supplies are donated by our Stamp Club members because our budget covers basic expenses. At Christmas time we give all of our members in facilities a poinsettia.

We have begun thinking about our annual Harvest Dinner. Jane VerMulm from the Diaconate will head the committee this year. Looking way back in our church history, the Women's Fellowship held the Harvest Dinner. It was one of their biggest fundraisers. You were required to purchase a ticket. They also sold homemade mincemeat. Cars would line up at the backdoor before the holidays to get their jars of mincemeat on a Saturday distribution day. After Women's Fellowship felt they could no longer hold the dinner the dinner responsibilities went to the Diaconate.



The annual Harvest Dinner will be held on November 19, 2023 after church. Before that date, there is much work to be accomplished! Jane Ver Mulm will be heading up the planning committee this year, and is asking for volunteers to help with the event. Each year, it takes 25-30 volunteers to make this event a wonderful one.
