


# Pilgrim's Progress

### Main Article-The Passover Meal

According to my calendar, Passover begins at Sunset, Monday, April 22 and ends at Sunset, Tuesday, April 23. Because of the different ways of figuring the dates, Passover does not always coincide with Easter, which is much earlier this year. But the first Communion service was a Passover Seder meal held by the Lord Jesus and His disciples and is filled with meaning. Several church members have experienced some version of the Passover meal and the story it tells of deliverance from slavery. I had hoped to hold a version of the Passover meal this year but it turns out that it is more involved and time consuming than I originally realized as it can take days to prepare and two or three hours to experience. A full traditional Passover meal can last six hours and I'm not sure how many people want to participate at this time. I would like to not something about the Passover meal that is very meaningful to me and that I've mentioned to the church on more than one occasion.

During the course of the meal and the story of deliverance from slavery in Egypt, everything served symbolizes parts of the story. Included are four cups of wine, each with its own name and meaning. They are the Cup of Sanctification, the Cup of Judgment, the Cup of Redemption and the Cup of Praise. The Cup of Sanctification speaks of God bringing the children of Israel out of the burden of their lives as slaves, the Cup of Judgment speaks of forcing Egypt to relinquish Israel, the Cup of Redemption speaks of paying all costs incurred by Israel, the Cup of Praise speaks of the destiny of all God's people. The Cup of Redemption is also know as the Cup of Blessing, and the Apostle Paul wrote that it is the Cup of Blessing that we take when we drink of the fruit of the vine during Holy Communion (1 Corinthians 10:16). It was the Cup of Blessing that Jesus held up in Matthew 26:26-29:

"And as they were eating, Jesus took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to the disciples and said, 'Take, eat; this is My body.' The He took the cup, and gave thanks, and give it to them, saying, 'Drink from it, all of you. For this is My blood of the new covenant, which is shed for many for the remission of sins. But I say to you, I will not drink of this fruit of the vine from now on until that day when I drink it new with you in My Father's kingdom.'"

Jesus finished the Passover meal with the Cup of Redemption-Blessing, the third of the four cups of the Passover meal. That means that He is waiting to finish the Last Supper with us in His Father's kingdom, and when we partake of Holy Communion, we are saying that we want to be there in His Father's Kingdom when He does so. Communion took on a deeper and more profound meaning when I learned that and it made me appreciate the Jewish roots of Holy Communion found in the Passover meal, which is still celebrated around the world to this day.

## Pillars of Faith @ F. C. C.

For those of you who read “Pillars of Faith” in February, the person was Norma Dannen. One of the definitions of a pillar is: a person or thing regarded as reliably providing essential support for something. In the New King James Version of the Bible, Paul writes in Ephesians 2:8-9, “For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; *it is* the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast.” This gift of God is the reason the receivers of this gift want to be the hands and feet of Jesus on earth. So, with these two things in mind, we would like to present the “Pillar of Faith” for March.

This Pillar of Faith grew up in Grundy County Iowa and went to the Christian Reform Church. This church had a good Bible base but being very strict there were a lot of nos, like no cards, no dancing, no movies, etc. The next church this person attended was a Lutheran Church, which was much like going to the Catholic Church.

Fisher Controls was his first job one year before he was drafted. Instead of letting that happen he enlisted in the Air Force and was stationed in Massachusetts. He met his wife thru an Air Force buddy’s neighbor who was a sister of that neighbor’s wife. He went to the Congregational Church with his wife and that was how he got connected with this denomination. When his time in the service was over he came back to Marshalltown and his job at Fisher Controls. He retired from there after 31 years of service to the company.

He and his wife checked out several churches in Marshalltown and found that the First Congregational Church was more to their liking. It was friendly and they were used to the order of the worship service. An activity they got involved in there was “Family Circle” which as the name implies was for the whole family including children. This group met once a month and there was a covered dish meal and games. Ann and Wally Junker and family attended and there was usually 25 or 30 people attending. Other areas he was involved in was the Diaconate for a couple of terms. It was in the 1970s and ‘80s when there were no women on this board. He got stuck with doing all the duties of being a deacon every month because no one else on the board wanted to do them. Later he was on the Board of Trustees for 17 years, which he chaired for 14 of those years. This board took care of the Building and Grounds with a Do-it-yourself committee. He liked F. C. C. so well he has belonged for 55 years. By the way he also does many behind the scenes things that keep the church safe and secure that no ones knows anything about.

When asked what was your favorite activity the reply was, “Trustees Board because of the building and grounds part. I also enjoyed the Do-it-Yourself things we did around the church.”

What advice do you have for the church? “Get in a habit of going to Church every Sunday no matter what!”
