

Pastor's Desk July 23-August 12, 13 The Fall of the Temple and the Exile of Israel In the Jewish Calendar, this portion of Summer heralds the sad anniversary of the fall of Jerusalem to the empire of Babylon, recorded in 2 Kings 25. It begins on July 23 and goes through August 13 and is remembered with prayer and fasts. This is not to be confused with the fall of Jerusalem predicted by the Lord Jesus, and which took place in 70 AD. Remembering the fall of the Temple and the exile of the nation reminds us to bemoan violence, note that selfishness and sin lead to destruction and death, that the best of human endeavors are frail compared to eternity. But there is a positive note to consider. While the city of Jerusalem has fallen more than once during the course of history, there is a Jerusalem that has not, nor ever will fall. In Christ we have a place in that kingdom, whose citizenship is shared by all who follow Christ. Our plans can be like words written on sand at the seashore, but the plans of God will never fail. Take time to remember the fall, but also take time to ponder and rejoice in the present and future plan of our Savior, which will never fail.



It is an honor to have the Reverends Miller-Todd worship with us regularly. Rev. Richard and wife, Rev. Katherine, have graciously filled our pulpit from time to time. As NACCC Mission and Outreach Representative, Rev. Rich made Pastor Dan aware that co-directors of a long-standing NACCC-partnered international mission were going to be in Iowa in late May. An ad hoc team of Moderator Miriam Bryant, the Board of Deacons (esp. Board Chair. Pat Anderson), Pastor Dan, the Miller-Todds, and the Schryvers scrambled to organize hospitality for the Ndungus over the Memorial Day weekend and coordinate a beautiful service during which the Ndungu's shared an impactful message inspiring faith and compassion among all who attended.

Among the major messages the Ndungus delivered was how they were called to create Happy Life Children's Home, a non-profit charity organization that aims to provide hope for abandoned children in Kenya through a three-fold Ministry: Shelter, Education and Medical care. Many who attended that service freely gave their email addresses to the Ndungus to maintain further contact and updates about their mission. Close to 1000 children have received life-saving, transformative assistance over the 22 years this mission has operated. Several churches in the U.S. and internationally (some Congregational) and individuals throughout the world (including in Kenya) support Happy Life Orphanages, schools, medical clinics and hospitals.

In June we were able to put up flags with our youth for Flag Day.



Pillars of Faith @ F. C. C.

For those of you who read "Pillars of Faith" in June, the person was Aaron Dickey. One of the definitions of a pillar is: a person or thing regarded as reliably providing essential support for something. In the New King James Version of the Bible, Paul writes in Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; <u>it is</u> the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast." This gift of God is the reason the receivers of this gift want to be the hands and feet of Jesus on earth. So, with these two things in mind, we would like to present the "Pillar of Faith" for July.

This month's Pillar of Faith came to Marshalltown from Linn County, Iowa where this person attended Eden United Church of Christ. The connection with First Congregational Church in Marshalltown began with a daughter, Lisa, being invited to be a member of Pilgrim Choir at the church. This choir was for young children. The daughter began to attend the Sunday School class for her age group. Not long after that, Al and Stella Storjohann, who lived in their neighborhood and were long time members of the church, invited Lisa's parent to come to an organ concert at church. This parent liked F. C. C. very much, "It felt like home!" and continued to attend, joining the church in April of 1982.

During the early 1980s when Rev. Richard was pastor of F. C. C., there was a "Clown Ministry" which was lead by Rev. Rich Miller Todd. This ministry was for children and adults who dressed up as clowns wearing traditional costumes and exaggerated makeup and carrying balloons. They presented Bible stories through mime at the church, in the community, in Iowa and as far away as Galesburg, Illinois. Our July Pillar of Faith was involved in this ministry and this was only the beginning. This Pillar also served on the Diaconate and the Music Committee. While on the Music Committee the current set of choir robes were purchased and this person was involved in the decision making. This person has been a crafter for the Women's group bazaars, a director for Children's Christmas programs and directed a Bible School play in conjunction with Central Christian Church. When "Heart Warmers" were first published, this person filled the orders by packing and shipping them. Other areas this person is or has been involved with at the church are: the social group, "Come Double", flowers on the altar each Sunday, seasonal decorating of the church, Choir and Bell Choir. She has also been, many times, soloist for "Special Music" at the 10:30 church service.

When asked which activity she enjoyed the most, the reply was: "It is a toss up between bells and singing!"

The advice this person has for the future of our church is: "I don't know how to make it happen, but we need to get younger families in our church, **Because** younger families are the future of our church!"
