"The purpose of this church shall be to bind together followers of Jesus Christ, for the object of sharing in the worship of God and in making His will dominant in the lives of men and women, especially as that will is set forth in the life and teachings of Jesus Christ."



A Sabbath, according to Judaism, is a sacred time between sundown on Friday and sundown on Saturday. It is a day of worship and rest, enshrined in the Ten Commandments. The first set of the Ten

Commandments, in Exodus 20, says this about the Sabbath:

Exodus 20:8-11 "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord your God. In it you shall do no work; you, nor your son, nor your daughter, nor your male servant, nor your cattle, nor your stranger who is within your gates. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it."

God didn't rest on the seventh day because He was tired, He did so to enshrine that we took time to rest for ourselves and that we respected rest for others as well. It reminds us that we are created, and accountable to a Creator, and that there is much more to life than doing a job. There must be time to reflect, relax and pray.

But the Ten Commandments were reviewed by Moses in Deuteronomy 5, with a slight change regarding Sabbaths. Verses 13 & 14 are similar to what was written in Exodus, but then there is verse 15:

Deuteronomy 5:15 "And remember that you were a slave I the land of Egypt, and the Lord your God brought you out from there by a mighty hand and by an outstretched arm; therefore the Lord your God commanded you to keep the Sabbath day."

Here the motivation for Sabbath is to remember our freedom and cherish it. Our slavery, according to the Bible, is more/spiritual. Before Christ we were slaves to sin and bound by it. But Sabbath reminds us all that there are people still in slavery, and we must never be complacent about it. Sabbath is about rest, certainly, and for Christian it is Sunday, the day of Resurrection. But Sabbath is also about rest, for us and for others and that no one should live a life with no rest, freedom or joy.

SPENCER, IA AREA FLOOD VICTIM BLITZ RELIEF EFFORT - THANK YOU, FCC!!!!



On Tuesday, July 23, 2024, Cherryl and Mike Woltjer loaded their Subaru with most needed items donated to Spencer, IA, area flood victims. They traveled the 190-mile distance to (and another 190-miles back) Foundation Churches relocated drop-off site for most needed items in the relief effort. Cherryl and Mike report that the aid workers were EXTREMELY grateful for the fans, Damp-Rid kits, cleaning tools and supplies, disposable dinnerware, baggies, toiletries, etc. that were donated by church members at First Congregational in Marshalltown. Our first thanks go to the Woltjer's for their generous

commitment of time and vehicle expenses to get your donations to the people who need them!

Among the most remarkable donations came from an anonymous donor. A plastic bin filled with handmade Afghans (about 10 in number) was left in the car port breezeway last month. The Mission and Benevolence Committee was given authority to pass these on to people who need them. Imagine the appreciation of those whose entire collection of bedding has been saturated by dirty, microbe infected flood waters. This surely was a Godsend.

FCC's two-pronged effort to help disaster victims in the Spencer area included a challenge to our church attendees to match up to \$2000 promised by the Mission and Benevolence Committee. We are so proud to announce the total contributed by FCC members through the deadline of Sunday, July 28, 2024 - \$3,500. With the committee pledge, the total we will donate to this effort is \$5,500.

The fund drive was adopted not just by our church but by our national and regional associations as well. A One Great Hour of Sharing initiative was launched by the NACCC across the nation earlier this month. Our contribution will be added to the NACCC initiative total. You all have made such a difference.

Pillars of Faith @ F. C. C.

For those of you who read "Pillars of Faith" in July, the person was Lynn Maas. If you haven't read this article in the church's newsletter and you have a computer, you can find it at this web site: https://www.fccmarshalltown.org/newsletter Thanks, Lynn, for all you have done, do, and will do!

One of the definitions of a pillar is: a person or thing regarded as reliably providing essential support for something. In the New King James Version of the Bible, Paul writes in Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; <u>it is</u> the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast." This gift of God is the reason the receivers of this gift want to be the hands and feet of Jesus on earth. So, with these two things in mind, we would like to present the "Pillar of Faith" for August.

This Pillar of Faith was born in Oregon, lived in South West Iowa and graduated from college. In the summer of 1963, this person secured a job in South Bend, Indiana. After a couple of years, this job did not meet expectations and so the search for a different job began. A favorite verse of this Pillar of Faith's is: Philippians 4:13 I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me. (NKJV) A job that turned out to be a good fit was in Marshalltown, Iowa at Fisher Controls.

After moving to Marshalltown, this young family began looking for a church to attend. They attended several churches and the First Congregational Church was one of them. They liked the setting at F. C. C., the people, they were friendly and the order of the service. They became regular attenders and joined the church in 1965. Belonging to a church leads to service in different capacities and that is what happened next.

This person's wife got involved in teaching Sunday School because this couple's children were attending each Sunday. The Pillar of Faith for this month helped his wife sometimes as she taught the class. He is grateful for the opportunity that God gave him to develop the skills and ability to serve Him in the following situations. He was a member of the diaconate and remembers calling people to help with ushering and fellowship time. Next he was on the Board of Trustees and served from 2005 - 2018. He was on the Endowment Committee through 2020 and served as the chairman after Rachel Mason retired from that duty. He served on the Cabinet as a Member at Large. He also helped to update the By-Laws of the Church. They also attended Cum Double, which was a social group that met once a month.

When asked which activity he enjoyed most the reply was, "The Trustees with the project management, long range planning and finance. As a project manager, some memorable projects were the Loft remodel, air conditioning of the lower level and exterior tuckpointing."

When asked what advice do you have for the future of our church the reply was, "A quarterly report to the congregation, would be helpful, of what is occurring as a result of our Vision to Mission work and what is planned in the near future. Also more utilization of the Loft to bring in young families."
