How to Think Like a Missionary

Ecclesiastes 3:11 "He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, He has put eternity in their hearts, except that no one can find out the work that

God does from beginning to end."

There's a book that came out in the '70's that told the story of a brave missionary who moved to the village of a notorious Indonesian tribe that was hostile to outsiders. They tolerated the missionary only because he introduced them to modern hand-held tools. After he eventually learned their language, the missionary told them the story of Jesus. They were attentive until they reached the point in the narrative where Judas betrayed Jesus. At that point, they erupted in celebration, for they considered treachery to be an art form. The missionary was at his wit's end, until he learned of the peace child. Whenever this tribe ended a war with another tribe, they were have a ceremony in which the leaders of the two tribes would meet with each other, each delegation bringing an infant. The two tribes would exchange infants and as long as the infants were alive, the two tribes would not go to war with each other. Each infant was a "peace child" and represented the vow never to go to war again. When the missionary explained that Jesus was God's peace child, a church was established in that tribe that continues to this day.

Western civilization, influenced extensively by Christianity, is far removed from the setting of the "peace child" story, but the waning influence of Christianity in the U.S. requires us to thing like missionaries, so here are a few suggestions. First, know that people need what the church offers, even though many may not believe that statement. Let it color your prayers for your neighbors and the people of this town. Second, become a student of people. What are their deepest needs, hope and concerns in this life. Ask yourself, in what way has God put "eternity in their hearts." Finally, be true in speech and action. People will accuse the church of hypocrisy, but lives of integrity and break through those accusations. While we are far removed from those brave missionaries in far flung fields, we do well to think like missionaries right here in Marshalltown.

Jonna sent an all-church email showing the heartfelt response of our congregation to the appeal by our National Association of Christian Congregational Churches in One Great Hour of Sharing for victims of Hurricane Helene. Pillars of Faith @ F. C. C.

For those of you who read "Pillars of Faith" in January, the person was Pat Anderson. One of the definitions of a pillar is: a person or thing regarded as reliably providing essential support for something. The Biblical definition of faith is found in Hebrews 11:1 which says, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Revised Standard Version. Also in the New King James Version of the Bible, Paul writes in Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; <u>it is</u> the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast." This gift of God is the reason the receivers of this gift want to be the hands and feet of Jesus on earth. So, with these two things in mind, we would like to present the "Pillar of Faith" for February.

The background for this month's Pillar of Faith starts in Keokuk, Iowa, a town in the far south eastern corner of our state. This person was raised in the Episcopal Church there and after the move, with parents, to Marshalltown at junior in high school age, this faith continued. In fact years later, this Pillar of Faith was married at St Paul's Episcopal Church in Marshalltown in 1975. When children started joining the family this couple started visiting other churches with less ritual. They visited several churches looking for somewhere comfortable and that would become their church home. They visited the First Congregational Church in 1989 and felt right at home. They were familiar with the church at large and Pastor Ellcey made them feel welcomed when they visited. Then Dick and Lucy Grossman started recruiting them to become members. They and later Pastor Ellcey visited them in their home; it was this personal touch and Congregationalism that grabbed them. They joined the church in 1989 or '90.

Pastor Ellcey was very personable and had a gift for encouraging members to fill roles within the church. Committees ran themselves but Pastor Ellcey always had his antenna up as to talents members showed to engage them in the church. In the late 1990s this Pillar of Faith served as Moderator. While in this role she attended two National Association of Congregational Christian Churches conferences, which were very inspiring to her. She taught Sunday School mostly at the high school level. She participated in many Bible studies, and with Cheryl Holmes designed a woman's Bible study on the book of Psalms. She also designed a Bible study based on the book "The Jesus I Never Knew" by Philip Yancey. She was a member of the "Go Team Mission Monterrey" each year between 2007-2010. The State Department urged this group not to go in 2010 because the unrest in Mexico made it unsafe for them and their hosts. She was a member of the Pastor Search Committee when Pastor Ellecy retired, and Barry Holmes was hired. She participated in VBS in supportive roles for several years, served on the Board of Christian Education and the Diaconate. She has also been on Missions & Benevolence for a decade and chaired it many times. She worked in partnership with Habitat for Humanity after the Derecho in Marshalltown. She was the chairperson of the Renewal Committee.

When asked which of these activities did you enjoy the most? The reply was, "I loved learning through Bible studies with my church family and teaching high school Sunday School. It was spiritually uplifting to be a part of the renewal committee and I learned so much."


