Bethany Wirin, Head of Marshalltown Christian School (MCS) met with Kim Schryver, Chair of FCC Benevolence and Missions Committee to get an update of the is school's programs, plans, students, faculty and facilities. Ms. Wirin graciously provided a tour. There are so many admirable elements of this accredited option for Begindergarten (pre-K) through 8<sup>th</sup> grade students.

The success of the school is evident in their growing numbers and waiting list for enrollment. MCS has basically doubled in student numbers in the last two years: 58 students in 2022-23; 99 students in 2023-24, and 125 students in 2024-25. Ninety-nine was the maximum capacity for their facility, so for this school year MCS arranged to lease classroom space from Journey Church to accommodate their 125 students. Next year they believe they hope to accommodate 1-2 additional youth in each of their nine classrooms, but no more. Forecasted census for 2025-26 is about 140 -145 students. The school has also been able to expand their

teaching staff to 11 full-time and 2 part time teachers. There are three members of their administration and one part-time staff members who runs their food service.

Seeing the student body work, play and create during the school session was a joy. Demographics are diverse including children from 30 different churches in our community (including FCC), several different races and ethnicities. There are about 17 – 18 students in each classroom. Strengths and interests are as varied as in any public school. In addition to the credentialed academic curriculum MCS provides vocal music, art classes and physical education as part of the regular weekly schedule. Cooperative agreements with Marshalltown Public School System enable MCS students to participate in instrumental music (band and/or orchestra), upper-level vocal music and art programs as well as sports and vocational training opportunities offered through the public system.



It is refreshing to learn about the Christ-centered start to each day at MCS. "Aroma" (for the sweet offering of praise lifted to God) includes worship music, U.S. Pledge of Allegiance, prayer and a brief acknowledgement of anyone with a birthday. The whole opening lasts about 10-15 minutes. Once a week, a 30-minute Chapel Service is held at the school. Every Wednesday morning a guest provides an age-appropriate message, praise music, scripture reading and prayer are included. Youth pastors (Shelly Speas from FCC has been a regular contributor; thanks, Shelly!), pastors, missionaries, alumni and occasionally a member of the student body serve as guest leaders for chapel. What an amazing blessing to be able to praise God openly during the school day.

MCS board of directors with the administration and faculty have just completed another four year strategic plan. Three main thrusts will guide their focus: 1) Build 3-4 new classrooms onto the present MCS building before the lease of classrooms from Journey Church needs to be renewed in 2029; 2) Investigate expanding grade level of instruction to 9<sup>th</sup> grade and beyond; 3) Improve faculty compensation closer to parity with public school instructors.

Mrs. Wirin was very responsive to having someone from administration provide a Mission Moment for our congregation sometime soon. We are working with Pastor Dan and the Board of Deacons to identify a date. Hoping you will enjoy hearing directly from a member of the leadership at this valuable community entity and feel blessed to know our church has been a loyal financial supporter since it opened.

#### Pillars of Faith @ F. C. C.

For those of you who read "Pillars of Faith" in February, the person was Kim Schryver. One of the definitions of a pillar is: a person or thing regarded as reliably providing essential support for something. The Biblical definition of faith is found in Hebrews 11:1 which says, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Revised Standard Version. Also in the New King James Version of the Bible, Paul writes in Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; *it is* the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast." This gift of God is the reason the receivers of this gift want to be the hands and feet of Jesus on earth. So, with these two things in mind, we would like to present the "Pillar of Faith" for March.

Before I introduce this month's Pillar of faith, this author finds it interesting that the last few Pillars of Faith have originally come from different parts of Iowa and the surrounding area. Maybe it was a job that brought them to Marshalltown but what brought them to First Congregational Church? I believe it is a sense of belonging first to the Triune God, (God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit) which causes one to seek to belong to a like minded community. Our Pillar of Faith for March 2025 is no exception.

Sheldon, Iowa is a city in O'Brien and Sioux counties, along to Floyd River in far North Western Iowa. This person went to the American Reformed Church which was colloquially referred to as the Dutch Reformed Church, a mainline Protestant Church. There was no confirmation at this church and you weren't baptized until you were ready. At age 14 this person was baptized and then joined the church at age 25.

In 1982, this person's spouse opened a sewing machine store on Main Street in Marshalltown. They bought a house and settled down. The spouse was a Catholic so they attended St. Mary's Catholic Church. This Pillar believes that it was only right that husband and wife should go to the same church. So she went with him. Later when the husband was gone she started looking for a Protestant Church.

One day Margaret Klink, a friend and member of FIrst Congregational Church invited her to come to a Sunday service. She liked it! It was like what she had known before.


She joined FCC in September of 1998. The first activity she was involved in was being a member of the Diaconate for two years. Next she became a member of the Benevolence & Missions Committee and continues serve on this committee. She delivered Meals on Wheels with Mary Vellinga several years and visits people in care facilities.

When asked which activity she enjoyed most, the reply was, "Benevolence & Missions Committee, it is a serious thing and does good works."

When asked what advice do you have to the future of our church? The reply was, after much discussion, "We need to grow our church. Everyone in our church should be praying that we are 'A Church of warmth and welcome that makes each person who walks in our doors for whatever reason feel like they belong.' "
